Throughout the year a variety of ENF publications and news releases present information about the bald eagle and other wildlife issues and problems, as well as events sponsored by the organization.

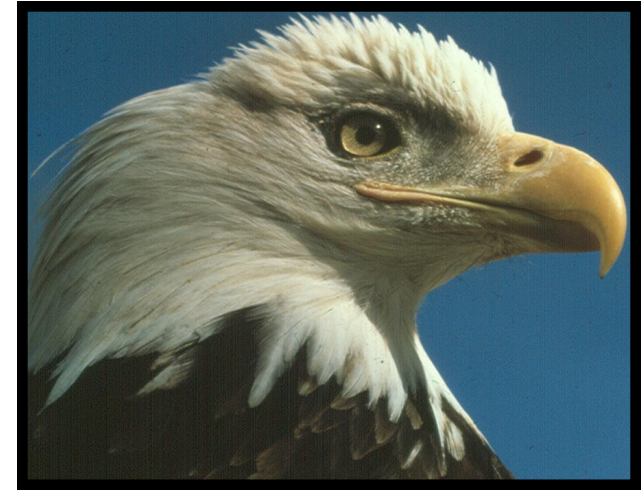

Bald Eagle Tours Along the Mississippi River



The Eagle Nature Foundation is pleased to once again offer our 4-hour bus tours to observe wintering bald eagles along the Upper Mississippi River. The tour bus will leave from the Best Western parking lot on the east side of Galena, IL promptly at 8:00 am on the mornings of Feb. 10th, and the 24th.

Bald eagles normally winter in large numbers along the Upper Mississippi River. This has allowed tour participants during past years to enjoy (depending upon the weather), from 30 to 450 bald eagles during a single four-hour bus tour. The past few years these tours have been observing fewer and fewer immature bald eagles, which reflects what is happening to the whole Midwestern bald eagle population. During the last tour in 2015 four out of five historic wintering communities had no bald eagles at all.

Mr. Ingram, who has been conducting these tours for over 50 years feels that the Midwestern bald eagle population wintering along the Mississippi River may be on the verge of collapse and recommends that people see the bald eagles while they hopefully still can. ENF's Annual Mid-winter Eagle Count reveals that the percentage of young eagles is back to the same, or lower levels, than it was in the 1960's.

Bald Eagles may be seen fishing, perching in trees, sitting on the ice, or even flying and migrating overhead as the tour bus visits five different historic bald eagle wintering communities. Each tour may have some excellent photographic opportunities, so don't forget to bring your camera.

Several different active bald eagle nests will be observed from a distance, so the nesting adults will not be disturbed. Tour participants do not just ride around and look at bald eagles. They get a four-hour enjoyable education about the bald eagle: its past, present and future. Some people come back and take the tour at a different time each year, because the wintering bald eagle population is dynamic and constantly changing from year to year and from week to week, so each tour is different.

The bald eagles' daily feeding habits, migration movements and life history, as well as survival problems, will be presented for your information and enjoyment. Each bald eagle wintering community has its own daytime feeding areas and nighttime roosts. Daytime roosts, as well as severe weather roosts, will be observed on each tour.

A tour participant will come away with a better appreciation of America's symbol, and an understanding of why we should all strive to keep the bald eagle flying free. We must work to save its habitat which is constantly being threatened, mostly being destroyed by government agencies, but with the consent of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.

The F&W claims the bald eagle population has recovered so well that they removed it from the Endangered Species List without having the necessary facts for doing so. Now the wintering population along the Mississippi River is lower than it was when the bird was first listed as endangered.

Doug Hoffman, our regular bus driver, has driven the bus for Mr. Ingram's eagle tours for over 40 years. The two of them have spent over 1,000 hours in the front of a tour bus together. Mr. Hoffman enjoys seeing our free flying National Symbol and is one of the best bald eagle spotters that Mr. Ingram has on the bus.

One of the most enjoyable four hours of my life. I never thought I would see so many bald eagles in one day! It was fantastic!

What to Bring With You

Tour participants should be prepared for winter weather with cold weather apparel; coats and gloves. Binoculars, telescopes, and cameras are recommended. Snacks are welcome.

Tour Guide Terrence N. Ingram



Researcher, author and speaker, Terrence N. Ingram, has researched and photographed bald eagles for over 55 years. He is the CEO and Founder of the Eagle Nature Foundation, Ltd., and has led tours to see wintering bald eagles for over 50 years.

Mr. Ingram personally may have observed more bald eagles in the wild than anyone else alive. On many occasions he has counted more than 1,500 bald eagles in a single day along the Mississippi River. He has personally discovered more bald eagle winter roost sites than any other person.

Mr. Ingram is Coordinator of the Annual Mid-Winter Bald Eagle Count conducted by the Eagle Nature Foundation throughout the Midwest. He is editor of *Bald Eagle News*, as well as *Nature News*, and is author of the out of print coffee table book, **EAGLE**. An autographed copy of this book may be auctioned during each tour. Mr. Ingram received the coveted Sol Feinstone Environmental Award from Syracuse University in 1979. He was named a "2006 Illinois Environmental Hero" by Lt. Governor, Pat Quinn. In 2011 the Eagle Nature Foundation honored him for 50 years of preservation work on behalf of the bald eagle. In 2015, the University of Wisconsin/Platteville honored him as an Outstanding Alumnus of the University.
